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Introduction

The AQA Religious Studies Specifications have been carefully drawn up to enable candidates of all faiths or denominations, or of none, to accredit their knowledge and understanding in Religious Studies. It acknowledges the varying needs of maintained schools, independent schools and faith schools and differences which may arise from local studies and practices in different places. The teams of examiners drawing up the specifications come from both the AQA (NEAB) and AQA (SEG) traditions and have many years experience in teaching at GCSE level. Some have taught in Roman Catholic, Church of England, maintained or independent schools, some have detailed knowledge of other faiths and all have a wide range of experience in drawing up specifications which meet the needs of Agreed Syllabuses and specific guidance provided by faith communities.

AQA takes careful note of the requirements of its centres and their requests and comments. It also receives information and documentation from The Catholic Bishops' Conference Department for Catholic Education and Formation, the Church of England Board of Education, Local Authorities and Faith Communities in order to be as fully informed as possible when establishing specifications. It is a clear intention to enable all candidates, from any tradition or none, to have equal access to Specification A *Christianity*. It is expected that the various options in this Specification will help centres to make decisions which will best accredit the specific knowledge and understanding of their candidates.

Note to Roman Catholic centres

AQA's GCSE Religious Studies Specification A *Christianity* addresses the four areas of study identified in the Catholic Bishops' Conference, Curriculum Directory (1996), namely Revelation, Church, Life in Christ and Celebration. It is also attentive to the draft Levels of Attainment and has taken cognisance of the aims rehearsed in the recently published Bishops' Conference Department for Catholic Education and Formation (Curriculum Guidance June 2006). AQA has mapped the main curriculum requirements against the different options in Specification A and these are set out in the grid which follows. AQA intends that the grids will assist centres in showing how the substance of the faith, referred to in the Bishops' Conference document, is examined within the papers of the Specification.
