Caerphilly Primary School Inspection Survey

Spring 2009 – Summer 2009

Main Findings

Spiritual Development

Spiritual development is a grade 2 (good features and no important shortcomings) or higher in every school inspected during Spring 2009 - Summer 2009. Five schools were awarded a grade 1 (good with outstanding features) and two schools a grade 2 (good features and no important shortcomings) in relation to pupils' spiritual development.

Collective Worship

The inspection reports identify positive features in relation to collective worship in many of the schools inspected.

Good features

- The legal requirements for collective worship are met.
- Makes a positive contribution to pupils' spiritual and moral and personal development.
- Opportunities provided for pupils to celebrate their special achievements.
- Opportunities provided for pupils to reflect.
- Strong emphasis on values and a sense of community.
- Significant contributions made to the acts of collective worshiping by visiting clergy and other members of the community.

Shortcomings

Limited opportunities for pupils to reflect on matters.

Religious Education

- Two schools received a short inspection where no subjects were inspected Cwmfelinfach Primary and Gilfach Fargoed Primary.
- One school received a standard inspection where RE was not one of the six subjects inspected – Derwendeg Primary.
- Standards in religious education were inspected in four schools Bedwas Junior, Plasyfelin Primary, St Gwladys Bargoed School and St James' Primary.
- Standards were judged to be a grade 1 (good with outstanding features) at Bedwas Junior School.
- Standards were judged to be a grade 2 (good features, no important shortcoming) at Plasyfelin Primary, St Gwladys Bargoed School and St James' Primary.

Outstanding features

- Pupils demonstrate excellent knowledge of events in the Christian calendar and link them appropriately with events in the Bible.
- Pupils' knowledge of the life of Jesus is particularly good.
- Pupils demonstrate an outstanding knowledge and understanding of Islam.
- Most older pupils consider, appreciate, respect and empathise with the viewpoints of others; they have an excellent understanding of the fact that all people have similarities and differences.
- All pupils have a strong awareness of the importance of safeguarding the environment and protecting the world. Many respond with awe and wonder to the natural world around them.

Good features

- Pupils develop a good knowledge and understanding of Christianity and other world religions.
- Visits made to places of worship in the local and wider community.
- Good understanding of the use and significance of religious artefacts.
- Opportunities provided for pupils to discuss and to reflect on religious and moral issues.
- Good understanding of religious concepts and symbols.
- Pupils able to raise questions about the world and aspects of religion.
- Pupils able to identify similarities and differences across religions.

Shortcomings

No shortcomings were identified in the reports where RE was inspected as a subject.

Additional information

Even though RE was not inspected as a subject in Gilfach Fargoed Primary the report notes that arrangements for assessing pupils' progress in religious education lack a formal structure. It is a recommendation for the school to extend assessment procedures at KS1 and KS2 to include all National Curriculum subjects and RE.
