SUBJECT: ABERCARN CEMETERY

REPORT BY: DIRECTOR OF THE ENVIRONMENT

### 1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 In accordance with paragraph 28.05 of the Authority's Financial Regulations, it is a requirement to report an increase in contract final account figures of more than 10% to the Policy and Resources Scrutiny Committee.

### 2. LINKS TO STRATEGY

2.1 The Public Services division's aim in its Service Improvement Plan for 2009/10 in relation to Bereavement Services is: -

"To provide a customer focused, sensitively delivered bereavement service and to achieve excellent standards in cemetery management and maintenance".

# 3. THE REPORT

- 3.1 Abercarn Cemetery is situated at Cemetery Road, Persondy and has been in operation as a municipal cemetery since February 1901.
- 3.2 The site was nearing full capacity and the need for a suitable extension was identified. The extension infrastructure works were procured via a competitive tender process managed by the Authority's in-house Engineering Consultancy.

3.3 Original contract sum : £119,485.18 Revised contract figure at final account : £162,290.40

Variance (percentage increase in scheme costs) : £ 42,805.22 (35%)

These extra costs were incurred as a direct result of:-

- The supply and installation of 255 metres of 1.8m high fence around the area £25,000 this item was not initially included in the contract. Quotations were received and the incumbent contractor was the most competitive. This item was therefore added to the contract as a variation order.
  - Installation of a tree protection zone barrier £7,200.
- Overlaying 150 sq. metres of existing tarmac track £2,800 this item was for the repair of existing defects within the cemetery. These were not included in the original tender but it was felt advantageous to use the incumbent contractor.
- Additional earthwork costs £7,805 during the initial survey, the site was very overgrown. Following clearance, a shortfall of material was identified and additional fill material needed to be imported.

## 4. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

4.1 The Public Services capital allocation had sufficient funds to meet the increased costs without affecting the overall budget.
