2. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest received at the commencement or during the course of the meeting.

3. MINUTES – 17TH FEBRUARY 2021

It was moved and seconded that the minutes of the meeting held on the 17th February 2021 be agreed as a correct record and by a show of hands-up this was unanimously agreed.

RESOLVED that the minutes of the Planning Committee held on 17th February 2021 (minute nos. 1-5) be approved as a correct record.

4. MINUTES – 3RD MARCH 2021

5. CODE NO. 20/0983/NCC - LAND WEST OF CORONATION TERRACE, SENGHENYDD, CAERPHILLY

The Planning Case Officer presented the application, with it confirmed in the accompanying report that the recommendation in respect of the proposal had taken full account of, and was in conformity with, both Future Wales and Planning Policy Wales Edition 11.

Following consideration of the application it was moved and seconded that the recommendation in the Officer's report be approved, and in noting there were 9 For, 0 Against and 1 Abstention this was agreed by the majority present.

Councillor J. Ridgewell wished it noted that he had abstained from voting as he not been present for the whole item.

RESOLVED that:-

- (i) subject to the conditions contained in the Officer's report the application be GRANTED;
- (ii) the applicant be advised of the attached comments from Dwr Cymru/Welsh Water and Western Power Distribution;
- (iii) the applicant be advised that the proposed development lies within an area that has been defined by the Coal Authority as containing potential hazards arising from former coal mining activity at the surface or shallow depth. These hazards can include: mine entries (shafts and adits); shallow coal workings; geological features (fissures and break lines); mine gas and former surface mining sites. Although such hazards are seldom readily visible, they can often be present and problems can occur in the future, particularly as a result of new development taking place.

It is recommended that information outlining how former mining activities may affect the proposed development, along with any mitigation measures required (for example the need for gas protection measures within the

foundations), is submitted alongside any subsequent application for Building Regulations approval (if relevant).

Any form of development over or within the influencing distance of a mine entry can be dangerous and raises significant land stability and public safety risks. As a general precautionary principle, the Coal Authority considers that the building over or within the influencing distance of a mine entry should be avoided. In exceptional circumstance where this is unavoidable, expert advice must be sought to ensure that a suitable engineering design which takes into account all the relevant safety and environmental risk factors, including mine gas and mine-water. The applicant's attention is drawn to the Coal Authority Policy in relation to new development and mine entries available through the following link: Coal Authority Policy

Any intrusive activities which disturb or enter any coal seams, coal mine workings or coal mine entries (shafts and adits) requires a Coal Authority Permit. The Planning Case Officer presented the application, with it confirmed in the accompanying report that the recommendation in respect of the proposal had taken full account of, and was in conformity with, both Future Wales and Planning Policy Wales Edition 11.

Mr M. Hiller and Councillor A. Whitcombe spoke on behalf of local residents in objection to the application. Councillor Whitcombe highlighted that he was speaking as the local ward member and not in any other capacity and left the meeting after making his statement and re-joined once the decision on the application had been reached.

Mr R. Timmins (the applicant's agent) spoke in support of the application.

During the course of the debate, it was moved and seconded that temporary planning consent be granted for 12 months to allow the Local Planning Authority to monitor the impact of the development on the residential amenity and highway safety of the area.

An amendment was moved and seconded to defer the application to the next meeting to allow for Traffic Management discussions around highway safety and the turning circle at the

site. Following debate, the seconder withdrew their support for the amendment which subsequently did not progress to a vote.

An amendment was then moved and seconded for the application to be granted as per the recommendation in the Officer's report, and in noting there were 2 For, 10 Against and 0 Abstentions, the amendment was declared lost.

Voting then took place on the substantive motion and in noting there were 10 For, 2 Against and 0 Abstentions this was agreed by the majority present.

RESOLVED that:-

(i) subject to the conditions contained in the Officer's report and the following additional condition the application be GRANTED for a temporary period of 12 months;

The Planning Case Officer presented the application, with it confirmed in the accompanying report that the recommendation in respect of the proposal had taken full account of, and was in conformity with, both Future Wales and Planning Policy Wales Edition 11.

Mrs K. Wynn and Councillor B. Zaplatynski spoke on behalf of local residents in objection to the application and Mr S. Groucott (the applicant's agent) spoke in support of the application.

Following consideration of the application it was moved and seconded that the recommendation in the Officer's report be approved, and in noting there were 11 For, 0 Against and 0 Abstentions this was unanimously agreed.

RESOLVED that subject to the conditions contained in the Officer's report the application be GRANTED.

9. FUTURE WALES - ISSUES AND CONSIDERATIONS - PRESENTATION

Mr Dave Lucas (Team Leader, Strategic Planning) gave a comprehensive overview of Welsh Government's recently published national development framework document (Future Wales) and its context in terms of planning decision-making in Wales.

Members were advised that Future Wales forms part of the Development Plan for Wales and is a material consideration in the determination of planning applications. Since 24th February

2021 it is a requirement that all development management decisions take account of Future Wales. Mr Lucas summarised the planning system and the policy structure for making decisions and it was noted that that most development management decisions are taken at a local level, although Welsh Government are responsible for determining nationally significant planning applications.

It was explained that Future Wales is split into national policies that apply across the whole of Wales and regionally specific policies that apply to each of the four identified regions in Wales. Members received an overview of the three statutory tiers to the Development Plan for Wales, namely the National Development Framework (Future Wales), Strategic Development Plans and Local Development Plans, with it noted that Development Management decisions must take account of all three tiers in their decision-making considerations (and not just the LDP). To assist in this, it is a requirement that lower tier plans are in general conformity with those plans in the higher tiers, meaning that the SDP will be required to be in general conformity with Future Wales, whilst the LDP will need to be in general conformity with both the SDP and Future Wales.

Mr Lucas then gave a detailed overview of Policies 1-18 that underpin the Future Wales document at a national level and highlighted the policies that are particularly relevant or contentious for Caerphilly County Borough (which sits under the South East region of Wales).

It was noted that Strategic Placemaking Principles (Policy 2) express a need to support the economic and social success of towns and cities, including sustaining public transport and facilities, and urban growth and regeneration, and should increase the population density of our towns and cities. New developments in urban areas should aim to have a density of at least 50 dwellings per hectare (net), with higher densities in more central and accessible locations.

Under Town Centres First (Policy 6), developments of a significant scale can broadly be defined as where the facility will serve a town, city or region-wide catchment. It is for planning authorities to determine whether a development is considered to be of a significant scale. National/Regional Connectivity (Policies 11-12) require Active Travel to be an integral component of all new development, and planning authorities <u>must</u> act to reduce parking levels in urban areas, whilst non-residential development must have 10% car parking spaces with charging points. Under Policy 16 (Heat Networks), Caerphilly town has been identified as a priority area for heat networks and in priority areas, planning authorities should identify opportunities for heat networks and plan positively for them. The Committee were also referred to Policy 19, which sets out the strategic policies for regional planning and the need for SDPs to embed placemaking as an overall principle.

Members were then provided with an overview of Policies 33-36 which are applicable to the South East region. Policy 33 identifies Cardiff, Newport and the Valleys as an area for national growth and WG supports co-ordinated regeneration and investment in the Valleys area to improve well-being, increase prosperity and address social inequalities.

Policy 34 introduces the requirement for the SDP to identify a greenbelt in the area to the north of Cardiff and Newport and the eastern part of the region. The key policy element is that LDPs and development management decisions should not permit development in areas shown for the consideration of greenbelts until the need for the greenbelt and its boundaries have been established in SDPs. This raises a significant issue as the regional diagram is an illustrative diagram and consequently it is impossible to determine the area boundaries for the greenbelt. This issue is more pertinent for LDP preparation but it could raise issues if development proposals are proposed in this area. It was noted that this requirement covers all forms of development proposals in this area.

Policy 35 supports the principle of the Valleys Regional Park and the proposals that establish it. Welsh Government will work with local authorities, the third sector and key partners to support the Valleys Regional Park and maximise opportunities for new development. Meanwhile, Policy 36 supports the development of the South East Metro and requires SDP and LDP policies to support its development. The key issue here is that planning authorities should plan for growth and regeneration around new and improved metro stations by identifying opportunities for higher density, mixed use and car free development.

Following the presentation, a Member sought clarification on the increase in proposed dwelling density under Policy 2 of Future Wales. Mr Lucas confirmed that this policy aspires for an increase from the average of 35 dwellings per hectare to at least 50 dwellings per hectare which may create significant issues around planning considerations.

A query was also received regarding the uncertainty around greenbelts and how/when the Authority would need to take this into consideration for planning applications. It was confirmed that all planning decisions as of 24th February 2021 need to take account of Future Wales in their determination; however, the issue is that Caerphilly county borough falls on the very edge of the greenbelt, so there is uncertainty around where these areas of consideration are, and they will not be established until the Strategic Development Plan begins its preparations and starts considering this issue. The matter has been raised with WG who have confirmed that they will take an understanding view of how the Authority addresses this issue in the meantime. Concerns were expressed that this may create difficulties for the planning authority going forward until the specifics around this particular policy are resolved.

Having considered the presentation, the Planning Committee noted its contents and Mr Lucas was thanked for his in-depth and informative update. Mr Lucas also confirmed that he would circulate the presentation slides to the Committee following the meeting and invited Members to contact him with any further questions they may have.

10. CHAIR'S ANNOUNCEMENT

Before concluding the meeting, the Chair announced that Mr Chris Boardman (Area Principal Planner) would shortly be leaving the Planning Department to take up a position elsewhere in the Authority. The Chair asked Members to remain in the session once the recording had stopped in order to thank Mr Boardman and wish him well in his new role.

The meeting closed at 7:43 p.m.

APPLICATION TYPE: Development without complying with conds

SITE AND DEVELOPMENT

<u>Location:</u> The application site is located on the eastern side of the B4251 (High Street), north of the access into Blackwood Retail Park and south of The Chartists Bridge. It lies outside of the settlement boundary of Blackwood and is located at Brookside Bungalows, Cwmgelli, Blackwood.

<u>Site description:</u> The application site is garden area associated with the curtilage of Rosebank Cottage and would be accessed via the same narrow strip of highway land adjacent to the B4251 that serves Rosebank Cottage and Woodview (Isycoed Cottages).

<u>Development:</u> Planning permission is sought to vary condition 01 of planning consent 16/0453/FULL (Erect new dwelling with associated access) to extend the time period in which the development can commence by a further five years.

<u>Dimensions:</u> The proposed dwelling is arranged in a cross shape and has a maximum footprint measuring 10.8 metres in depth by 11.7 metres in width and a height of 7.0 metres to ridge level.

<u>Materials:</u> The external finishes comprise of render and timber cladding, slate roof tiles together with upvc doors and windows.

<u>Ancillary development, e.g. parking:</u> The proposed driveway is large enough to accommodate 4 cars.

SECTION 17 CRIME AND DISORDER ACT

What is the likely effect of the determination of this application on the need for the Local Planning Authority to do all it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in its area? There are no specific crime and disorder implications material to the determination of this application.

EU HABITATS DIRECTIVE

Does the development affect any protected wildlife species? In that the site the subject of this application is a domestic garden, based on current evidence, the proposal is unlikely to have a significant impact on biodiversity. However, Policy 9 of Future Wales - The National Plan 2040 states that action towards securing the maintenance and enhancement of biodiversity (to provide a net benefit), the resilience of ecosystems and green infrastructure assets must be demonstrated as part of development proposals through innovative, nature based approaches to site planning and the design of the built environment. Full planning permission (planning reference 16/0453/FULL) included a bird breeding clearance condition together with the provision for the developer to provide biodiversity enhancements within the site. It is therefore considered that the same conditions should be imposed if members are mindful to grant permission.

<u>Is this development Community Infrastructure Levy liable?</u> Yes the development is CIL liable and falls within the mid viability charging area for which CIL is charged at a rate of £25 per square metre of internal floor space plus indexation.

ANALYSIS

<u>Policies:</u> The application has been considered in accordance with national policy and guidance and local plan policies.

The original scheme for consideration in respect of application 16/0453/FULL was reported to planning committee with a recommendation to refuse the application on the grounds that the proposed dwelling would have an unacceptable overbearing impact on the north facing windows of the adjacent property known as Woodview to an extent whereby the neighbouring occupiers would result in a loss of daylight and outlook. The application was subsequently deferred by members at the Planning Committee held on 3rd August 2016 to allow the applicant the opportunity to submit amended plans to address the concerns of Officers.

The applicant submitted amended plans to reposition the proposed dwelling further 2.1 metres away from the boundary of Woodview with the amended siting resulting in the dwelling being located 9.2 metres to the north of Woodview.

Having regard to the orientation of the neighbouring properties it was not considered that the proposed dwelling would result in any adverse overshadowing impacts to the occupiers on Woodview given the trajectory of the sun's movements throughout the day. Furthermore, it was considered that the shape of the proposed dwelling and its relationship to the ground floor north facing windows of Woodview would not result in an overbearing impact or loss of outlook from Woodview to a degree to warrant a refusal of planning permission. On that basis members resolved to approve the proposed dwelling at the Planning Committee held on 14th September 2016.

This application seeks to vary Condition 01 of planning consent 16/0453/FULL to further extend the period of time within which the development can commence. In this regard it should be recognised that the Welsh Government Development Management Manual confirms that Sections 73 (2) and (4) of the Town and Country Planning 1990 Act restricts the Local Planning Authority in their determination of section 73 applications. The effect of the provisions is to limit the Local Planning Authority to considering the question of whether the conditions identified in the section 73 application should apply as originally stated, would be acceptable if modified or it would be acceptable to remove them. The Local Planning Authority cannot revisit the original permission and reconsider whether it should have been granted in the first place. However, as a section 73 application is a planning application in its own right, it is necessary to assess what material changes there may have been since the original permission was granted in order to ensure that all relevant material considerations have been assessed.

Therefore, the main consideration in the determination of this application is whether there has been any material change in circumstances since 2016. In that regard the application site remains outside of the settlement boundary of Blackwood and within green wedge designation SI1.9 Blackwood, Oakdale and Penmaen.

In terms of the above, whilst the application site is located outside the defined settlement boundary, it is located wholly within the curtilage of an existing residential property, and would adjoin the residential boundary of another residential property, Woodview.

In terms of the green wedge, the application site is currently garden curtilage and would therefore not extend into any open areas of the green wedge. On this basis, it is not considered that the proposed development will lead to the erosion of the green wedge and the coalescence of Blackwood, Oakdale and Penmaen. Furthermore, it should be noted that erection of three dwellings to the south of Woodview (the property adjoining the site) have been approved more recently (planning references 17/0431/OUT and 20/0217/RM), these too would lie outside of the defined settlement boundary of Blackwood and within green wedge designation SI1.9 Blackwood, Oakdale and Penmaen.

It should also be noted that Planning Policy Wales Edition 11 still supports infill development outside of settlement limits subject to where those developments can be best accommodated in terms of infrastructure, access, habitat and landscape conservation together with being of a scale and design that respects the character of the surrounding area. The merits of the application site were previously considered acceptable subject to national policy limitations. There has been no change to national policy limitations or local planning policies since and the extant permission would infill a gap in the existing street scene. Furthermore, the proposed dwelling would be located in a highly sustainable location on the edge of Blackwood Town Centre with all its services, amenities and excellent public transport links. On that basis the proposal would still comply with national planning policy.

Policy CW2 of the Local Development Plan (LDP) sets out the criteria relating to amenity. The impacts associated with neighbouring and visual amenity were previously considered. However, it is important to note that additional considerations was given to neighbouring amenity during the determination of planning consent 20/0217/RM and how the impact of this consented development, whilst not yet implemented (planning permission 16/0453/FULL) would have upon any future occupiers of the three dwellings associated with planning reference 20/0217/RM. On that basis the proposed development still complies with all of the criterion associated with Policy CW2

Policy CW5 explains that development proposals will only be permitted where they do not have an unacceptable adverse impact upon the water environment and where they would not pose an unacceptable risk to the quality of controlled waters (including ground water and surface water). In that respect from the 7th January 2019, Schedule 3 of the Flood and Water Management Act 2010 commenced in Wales requiring all new developments of more than one house or where the construction area is of 100m2 or more to implement sustainable drainage to manage on-site surface water. Surface water drainage systems must be designed and built in accordance with mandatory standards for sustainable drainage published by Welsh Ministers.

In that the proposed dwelling exceeds a construction area of 100m2, should members be mindful to grant planning permission to extend the time period in which the development can commence by a further five years, it would no longer be possible to impose a condition to any consent requiring a scheme for land and surface water to be submitted within the site and the developer would therefore be required to obtain Sustainable Drainage Approval from the SAB Authority prior to commencement of the development. Whilst no comments have been provided from the Senior Engineer (Land Drainage), any Sustainable Drainage scheme would need to demonstrate that there will be no adverse impacts to existing drainage systems and watercourses. Notwithstanding the above, members are advised that this is a technical approval independent of the need to obtain planning permission. Informative advice will however be provided to the applicant. Consequently, in that the need to obtain an independent Sustainable Drainage Approval is a legislative requirement, the proposal accords with policy CW5 of the LDP.

In conclusion, the proposed development is solely seeking to extend the period of time in which the development can commence. The principle of a dwelling within the curtilage of Rosebank Cottage has previously been established and there would be no changes to the previously approved plans, access and off-street car parking requirements. On that basis, where necessary, subject to imposing the same conditions as per the extant permission, the proposed development is considered to be acceptable in planning terms and therefore accords with the Caerphilly County Borough Local Development Plan up to 2021 - Adopted November 2010.

Comments from public: No representations received at the time of writing the report.

Other material considerations: None.

The duty to improve the economic, social, environmental and cultural well-being of Wales, has been considered in accordance with the sustainable development principle, under section 3 of the Well-Being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015. In reaching the recommendation below, the ways of working set out at section 5 of that Act have been taken into account, and it is considered that the recommendation is consistent with the sustainable development principle as required by section 8 of that Act.

Future Wales - The National Plan 2040 was published on 24 February 2021 and forms part of the statutory development plan for the county borough. In addition to this Planning Policy Wales (PPW) has been amended to take account of Future Wales and PPW Edition 11 has also been published on 24th February 2021. In reaching the conclusion below full account has been taken of both Future Wales and PPW Edition 11 and where they are particularly pertinent to the consideration of the proposals they have been considered as part of the officer's report. It is considered that the recommendation(s) in respect of the proposals is (are) in conformity with both Future Wales and PPW Edition 11.

<u>Living Decision Document:</u> Condition 01 of planning consent 16/0453/FULL has been varied by consent 21/0466/NCC dated 16.06.2021 granted by Caerphilly County Borough Council.

- Prior to the occupation of the development hereby approved, nesting sites for birds shall be provided as part of the approved development.
 REASON: To provide additional roosting for birds as a biodiversity enhancement, in accordance with Part 1 Section 6 of the Environment (Wales) Act 2016, Policy

9 of Future Wales: The National Plan 2040 (2021), Planning Policy Wales Edition 11 (2021), Technical Advice Note 5: Nature Conservation and Planning (2009) and policies CW4 and SP10 of the adopted Caerphilly County Borough Local Development Plan up to 2021.

12) The development hereby approved shall make provision for gigabit capable broadband infrastructure capable of serving the approved dwelling. The necessary infrastructure required shall be installed prior to beneficial occupation of the dwelling.

REASON: To provide the necessary infrastructure to serve the development in accordance with Policy 13 of Future Wales: The National Plan 2040.


